


### Philippe Cousteau

Octopus, Squid and Sharks, Oh My!

National Geographic Channel reptile expert Dr. Brady Barr is the first scientist ever to capture and study all 23 species of crocodilians in the wild. Dr. Barr has also participated in other research projects with leading scientists throughout the world. The Seattle Aquarium has worked with Dr. Barr in support of his show "Dangerous Encounters" on episodes about sixgill sharks, squid and octopus.

### Dr. Rick Keil

Spicing Up the Waterways of Puget Sound

Dr. Keil is an Associate Professor at the School of Oceanography, University of Washington. He and his team of undergraduate researchers formed the nonprofit program SoundCitizen in late 2008 to help bring citizens into active research on the connections between urban watersheds and Puget Sound. Dr. Keil will discuss how by tracking cooking spices and emerging pollutants from households to Puget Sound, we can better understand how our daily lives and activities affect our local waterways.
